I lectured on August Wilson at the Black History Month celebration of Hillman Library; I gave a talk on local black leadership to Leadership Pittsburgh; I was interviewed by Elaine Effort of KQV radio; I gave a talk at Giant Eagle's Saturday Tributes to Black History; I spoke at Winchester-Thurston School; I spoke in the Anthropology Department at Pitt; and I chaired a panel at Joe Trotter's CAUSE conference on Blacks in the Urban Economy.

May 9-16, I gave a series of lectures at Newcastle University (England) on Pittsburgh, August Wilson, and the Black Arts Movement.

Department Service I served as Secretary of the History Department, furnishing minutes of department meetings. I was appointed chair of the Search Committee for a hire in African American history for the next academic year.

Ambedkar, considered the "Liberator of India's Untouchable Peoples." The conference takes place in San Jose, California, and is organized by the Ambedkarites of America.

Tours

I promoted efforts to preserve what is left of the historic Hill District. Toward that end, I gave three tours of the Hill District. One was for Chris Rawson's class on August Wilson, another for a combined group of Young Professionals of the Urban League and the United Jewish Federation. On May 30 I gave a tour of the Hill for officers of the National Trust for Historic Preservation, during its national convention in October.

Community Service

I continued my community service, being active in the local branch of the African American Historical and Genealogical Society, advising the Fine Arts Department regarding materials for a fall showing of African American art, serving on the Advisory Board of the Pittsburgh History and Landmarks Foundation and also on the Diversity Committee planning for the 2007 convention of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. I also served, along with Joe Trotter of C-MU, as co-chair of the African American Advisory Committee to the Heinz History Center, and worked with the Center in planning an upcoming exhibit on black soldiers in the Vietnam War.
